A few notes from the game:



• Lifecycle Events: Confirmation •

We've barely finished paying off the Bar Mitzvah, and now it's Confirmation time! Where have the years gone?

Confirmation does not have the long history that the Bar Mitzvah does. It was developed by the Reform movement, which didn't buy into the idea that a 13-year-old was an adult. So the Bar Mitzvah was abolished and Confirmation took its place as a coming-of-age ritual. Today it's common for children to celebrate both a Bar Mitzvah and Confirmation, although far fewer kids "make it" through religious school to Confirmation age (10th grade).

Confirmation is tied to the Jewish festival of Shavuot, which celebrates the Jews receiving the Torah at Mount Sinai. Today it is a celebration of Torah, education, and activity choosing to participate in Jewish life.

Unlike a Bar Mitzvah, which is usually an individual endeavor (in some congregation's celebrants "double up", but each has separate responsibilities and reads a different part of the Torah portion), Confirmation is celebrated by the group of students who reach 10th grade. These students study together in religious school starting after their B'nai Mitzvot, and often they have social events, trips with Jewish themes, and participate in social action activities together.

Confirmands lead the Congregation in a worship service, usually focused on a theme such as learning, social justice or Israel. This theme is incorporated into the service and the sermon. The service may be very creative, with students offering less known variations on common prayers, poetry readings, and personal reflections.

The service is usually followed by a group or individual celebrations, which of course include bagels and lox!

What is lox?

You are at the party, surveying the buffet table, and you wonder what the heck that slimy salmon-colored stuff is. It's slimy salmon! But not just plain old slimy salmon. This salmon has been salt-cured or brined and then cold-smoked and the result is a delicacy so coveted that my grandmother once knocked an unsuspecting teenager out cold with her purse to get to the last piece. Okay, not really, but if you knew my grandmother you know she was perfectly capable of this.

Lox is smoky, salty and delicious and is usually loaded onto a bagel on top of a nice schmear of cream cheese and under some red onions and capers and eaten open sandwich style. Yum.

And speaking of food:

"The Jewish people have observed their 5,777nd year as a people," the Hebrew school teacher informed his class. "Consider that the Chinese have observed only their 4,710th. What does this mean to you?"

After a reflective pause, one student volunteered, "Well, for one thing, according to my calculations, the Jews had to do without Chinese food for 1,067 years."
